### ASSOCIATED AUXILIARIES ELECT 1960-61 OFFICERS

Without campaigns, "great debates" or whistle stops, the Associated Auxiliaries of Riddle Memorial Hospital launched its second year Oct. 10 by electing its second slate of officers.

Mrs. Charles A. (Miriam) McCafferty, who was vice-president, succeeded Mrs. Lucullus N. D. (Ethel) Mitchell, Associated Auxiliaries' first president.

Other newly elected officers: Mrs. William H. (Skip) Baird moved up from secretary to vice-president; Mrs. Duane B. (Nancy) Roach, retiring president of the Riddlewood Auxiliary, is the new secretary; and Mrs. Donald V. (Anne) Cooper, retiring president of the Media Auxiliary, was re-elected treasurer.

Before turning the chair over to Mrs. McCafferty, Mrs. Mitchell congratulated the new officers.

Mrs. McCafferty, upon taking over the gavel, replied that "we're proud of our achievements under our first president, Ethel Mitchell. Under her leadership, Associated Auxiliaries has presented quite a challenge to us for the future."

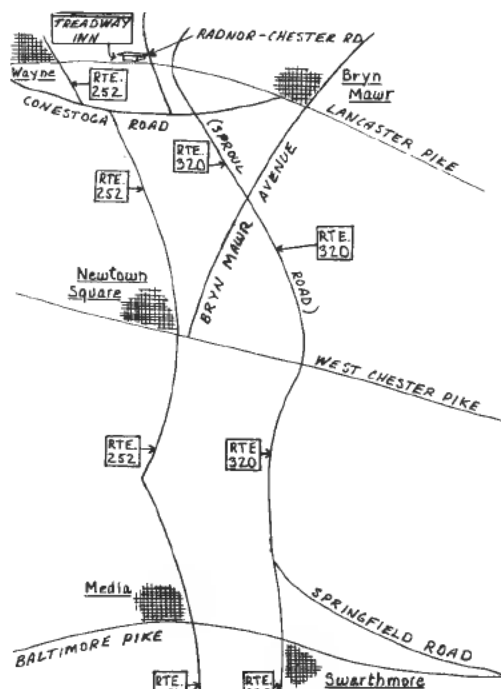
The new president added that "each person on this board shares equally the responsibility for what we achieve."

The four officers were elected unanimously and without opposition by the members of the Associated Auxiliaries. Their names were placed in nomination by Mary Mallon, chairman of the nominating committee (and Springfield president). #### POLICIES, PROCEDURES, PROGRAMS AND BY-LAWS

October was let's-get-squared-away month for the Associated Auxiliaries. In the regular Oct. 10 meeting and at a special 'think' session Oct. 17, the A.A. adopted a number of new policies and set in motion some organizational procedures aimed at helping a rapidly growing aggregation to function effectively and efficiently. Here are the ABC's:

**A** - The Associated Auxiliaries voted unanimously to limit its major projects to three a year. As of now they are the Country Fair, the Fashion Show, and the Charity Ball.

**B** - The A.A.'s new rules committee (Marion Weathers, chairman, DeDe Coffin, Anne Fuselli, Mary Jelinek and Mary Mallon) will draw up and submit to the Hospital's Board of Directors a set of by-laws to govern the Associated Auxiliaries, like the set that now governs the individual auxiliaries.

**C** - The A.A. approved a ruling by President Miriam McCafferty prohibiting it from participating in fund-raising activities of other organizations.

**D** - There has been a reaffirmation of the existing rule prescribing that merchants in the Hospital's area shall be approached for contributions only once each year.

**E** - It has been agreed that all members of the Associated Auxiliaries - the presidents and non-officer representatives of each auxiliary, the officers of the A.A., the past president of the A.A., and the chairmen of the standing committees - shall have the right to vote on all matters before the Associated Auxiliaries Board.

**F** - It was decided to draw up a by-law determining when the individual auxiliaries' \$25 annual dues to the A.A. are due and payable.

#### PROFILE

Jean (Mrs. Frank M.) O'Brien

Jean O'Brien joined the Bowling Green Auxiliary about a month after it was formed last year because she was looking for a project "where you can give something of yourself". And ever since then she's been demonstrating that she wasn't kidding. Jean O'Brien's giving of herself to Riddle activities is a perfect example of the kind of dedication that has produced the Auxiliaries' great record of achievement.

Jean took hold immediately as Bowling Green President. Then she took on the duties of handling publicity for the Associated Auxiliaries, a job she is still doing. Jean O'Brien's energies, however, are by no means absorbed by these assorted tasks for Riddle. She is also serving on several committees for the Junior Woman's Club of Swarthmore, and is treasurer and new-member chairman for the Woman's Golf Association of Rolling Green Golf Club.

Golf, at which she says she is "fair", is one of her hobbies. Another is gardening. Others: bridge and reading.

Still another (where does she find the time?) is short story writing.

You get the feeling, from the way she talks about it, that this could become more than a hobby if encouragement in the form of a few acceptances came along. She confesses to having been inspired to write by a professor at the University of Michigan in her undergraduate days there.

Jean is a native Detroit, incidentally, and only came east - lucky break for Riddle - because Frank O'Brien's business brought him East. He is administrative sales manager for the Scott Paper Company.

The O'Briens have lived for the last five years at the quaint address of 102 Quaint Rd., Bowling Green. The most important member of the family is Patricia, their 9-1/2 year old daughter. Others who share the domestic tranquility of the O'Brien menage are "Perry the Parakeet" and a German Shepherd with the unlikely name of "Anna".

The O'Briens are members of the Swarthmore Presbyterian Church, and Jean also finds time every summer to chauffeur campers to the summer day camp of the Crippled Children's Society on the Swarthmore College Campus.
