#### INTRODUCING THE BOARD

#### W. Scott Smith

Riddle's Board of Directors showed its shrewdness in selecting its liaison officer to the women's auxiliaries. In addition to the more basic attributes he brings to the job, W. Scott Smith is affable, handsome and youthful.

He is much else, however, that makes him a fine addition to the Riddle team. His abilities have manifest themselves, among other ways, by the fact that, at 37, he is already general manager of the Industrial Farm & Equipment Corporation of Chester, after less than 12 years with the firm.

Scott Smith went with Industrial Farm & Equipment right out of Syracuse University, where he majored in sales management, graduated with a B.S. degree and learned to put his shoulder to the wheel (as well as to rivals) as tackle on the football team and a member of the lacrosse team.

Mr. Smith's shortlived football career at Syracuse (he had to give it up because of an injury) was a natural follow-through from his days at Haverford School, where he was All-Interac tackle for three years.

Just before he was to graduate from Haverford School, he entered the Marines (in 1942), spent 22 months in the Pacific, saw extensive action under fire, was wounded in September of 1944 and sent back to the States, where he finished out his hitch in 1946.

Out of the service, he finished his secondary school training at Brown Prep and moved on to Syracuse, where he also participated in intramural sports and became a member of Delta Kappa Epsilon.

In 1950, he married the former Kathleen Eyre Stull. They have two sons, W. Scott III, who is 9, and Rodman Wetherill, 7. Both are following in Dad's footsteps at Haverford School, though still a little young for the varsity football team.

The Smiths belong to St. Alban's Episcopal Church in Newtown Square (they live on Newtown Street Road), and he is also a member of the Merion Golf Club, the Racquet Club and the Vesper Club.

A once-a-week, 11-handicap golfer, Scott Smith is also a devotee of the rod & reel, and enjoys deep-sea fishing off his cabin cruiser in Chesapeake when the weather calls for it.


He became a member of Riddle's Board of Directors last August and has been demonstrating ever since what a wise choice the directors made in inviting him aboard.
