# Riddle Memorial Hospital Is A Building; Contract Signed Foundation Work Has Started

That hospital you've all been working for so hard has taken the first physical step toward the actualization we've all been waiting for.

A contract for footings and foundations was signed Mar. 18 with Nason & Cullen of Philadelphia. And staking out of the ground began-as a happy omen-on the first day of Spring, 1961.

Progress on the work is a good ten days ahead of the schedule of procedure set up in December.

And it's going to stay that way, if Riddle's Board of Directors and General Manager Ed James have anything to say about it. An accelerated, carefully coordinated schedule of bidding, contract-signing and construction is now in operation.

The aim, Mr. James told us, is to get the building up and enclosed "before the snow flies next winter." And actual operation during 1962 is now probable.

Nason & Cullen were low bidders for the footings and foundations contract, which they were awarded following public bidopenings for that contract. Public bidopening, incidentally, will be the practice on all construction contracts let by the Hospital; and the contracts will normally go to the lowest responsible bidder.

### Mrs. Robert W. (Ruth) Graham

Paradox: one of the ablest and hardestworking Riddle "auxilians" will probably never hold a major office in the organization.

That's Rose Tree's Ruth Graham, and she's her own paradox-producer. She won't accept 'high office', preferring to labor mightily in the ranks for Riddle. And this she has done and is doing, even though her "official" activities include only chair-manship of the erstwhile "White Elephant Booth" (operative before Rose Tree Auxiliary was formed), a stint as Rose Tree Publicity chairman, co-chairman of last year's Charity Ball, Rose Tree representative on the Women's Board, and (currently) corresponding secretary of both Rose Tree and the Women's Board. "only" did we say?

Ruth Graham started life in Chicago a few years ago, and arrived at her present Paxon Hollow Rd. address via Bronxville, Philadelphia (where she worked for the Blum Store for seven years), Rosemont, Wallingford, and a farm near Phoenixville.
