Fanny Feaster Named As Chairman Of Country Fair For Next Year

Mrs. Francis M. (Fanny) Feaster, a charter member of the Beatty Hills Auxiliary, has been named 1962 chairman of the Riddle Memorial Hospital Country Fair.

Mrs. Feaster, who succeeds Mrs. William A. Watson of the Rose Tree Auxiliary, was appointed by Mrs. Charles A. McCafferty, president of the Women's Board of the Associated Auxiliaries.

Mrs. Watson, who was chairman for two consecutive years and prominent in the management of each of Riddle's four fairs, had previously indicated that she would not serve in the job again. She is currently 2nd vice-president of the Women's Board.

Mrs. Marius L. (Becky) Brohard and Mrs. Frank (Jean) O'Brien, co-chairmen under Mrs. Watson this year, also declined the chairmanship of the 1962 Fair.

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Eight New Presidents Elected Five Re-named As Auxiliaries Ballot For New Officer Staff

Riddle's 13 auxiliaries have elected eight new presidents, re-elected four and elected one that had been appointed president during the fiscal year.

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No Final Figures In Yet But Fair Was Artistic & Social Success

No, folks, we don't know down to the last penny just how much green stuff the Country Fair cleared for Riddle. In fact, when the Riddlegram went to press, nobody knew, because the total can't be tallied until returns from the Sept. 30-Oct. 1 Horse Show are in, all expenses are paid and a couple of adding machines are worn out.

Retiring Country Fair Chairman Donnie Watson (see page 1) did offer the hopeful estimate that "we should double what we made when the Fair was held at Rose Tree before."

That would be in the vicinity of \$10,000. The Fair cleared \$5000 at Rose Tree in '58 and \$5400 there in '59, the first two years it was held. More on that when the final facts are in.

One other financial note: the Teenage Kickoff Dance September 8, a pre-Fair event, netted almost \$200, Mrs. Watson reported at the September Women's Board meeting.

Whatever the overall financial results, the Fair was a thoroughgoing artistic and social success. Its wide-ranging events and colorful booths and throngs (estimated at 14,000 by veteran car-parker Rabbitt Snear) were encompassed by weather invented just for fairs--golden, crisp and comfortably cool.
