Candidates Listed

Skip Baird Only Nominee For Job Of President; Jelinek, Mallon Vie For Second Spot On Board Ticket

Barring some totally unforeseen eventuality, Mrs. William A. (Skip) Baird will be elected president of the Women's Board of Riddle Memorial Hospital's Associated Auxiliary at the June 11 meeting.

This was assured when Mrs. Baird's name was presented as the only candidate for the office by the nominating committee at the May 14 meeting, and nominations were closed without any other candidates for president being placed in the field.

Nominations cannot be re-opened at the election meeting in June, so Mrs. Baird's election will be a formality.

That makes the balloting for 1st vice-president the most important, especially because a tradition is developing to consider the 1st vice-president the most likely candidate for president the following year. Mrs. Baird is the incumbent 1st vice-president.

Nominees for 1st vice-president are Mrs. Frank H. (Mary) Jelinek, past president of the Rose Tree Auxiliary, and Mrs. Charles F. (Mary) Mallon, past president of the Springfield Auxiliary.

Mrs. Baird is a past president of the Middletown Auxiliary, and there are three other past or incumbent presidents, six in all, among the candidates for the various offices.

The other unopposed candidate is Marion Weathers, up for re-election as treasurer, in which post she is now serving her first term. Miss Weathers is past president of Lima Auxiliary.

There were no nominations from the floor for any office. The following are the candidates for the other offices, presented to the Women's Board by the nominating committee, headed by Jane Warwick, Media president, who succeeded Mrs. Mallon when she became a candidate:

2nd vice-president--Mrs. F. M. (Fannie) Feaster of Beatty Hills, general chairman of the Country Fair, and Mrs. Bartine A.
