With approval voted by the Women's Board at its meeting Oct. 8, Cheyney Auxiliary officially became the 17th of the Associated Auxiliaries of Riddle Memorial Hospital.

The newest auxiliary, which has 38 charter members, is headed by Mrs. J. Cardwell Stevens of Media.

Incomplete Earnings Figures Show Associated Auxiliaries Approaching \$25,000 Goal In First Pledge Year

The returns aren't all in yet, but it looks like Riddle's Associated Auxiliaries will reach their initial goal in the first of three years during which they have pledged \$25,000 a year to the Hospital's building fund.

Yearly earnings turned over to the Hospital from 13 of the 17 auxiliaries (the only figures available at Riddlegram press time) totaled \$10,903, with Media, Concord and Swarthmore still unreported and Cheyney to new to report.

Five auxiliaries raised \$1000 or more. Rose Tree topped the list of those reporting with \$2005.92; Nether Providence turned in \$1548.94; Beatty Hills, \$1300; Middletown, \$1200; and Lima \$1000.

Country Fair Chairman Fanny Feaster explained that final results of the Fair are not yet completed, but she expects the Fair to earn a net of at least \$10,000.

Supporting this estimate with a vengeance was Pat Mann's prize coupon results, showing a net of \$7803 for the hospital.

Three auxiliaries, Prize Coupon Chairman Mann reported, sold more than \$1000 worth of coupons. They are: Rose Tree, \$1945; Lima, \$1718; and Beatty Hills, \$1187.65. (Where did that extra 15¢ come from?)

With minimal Country Fair expectations at \$10,000 net (we guess it'll be more than that), almost \$11,000 in from the auxiliaries, with three to go, and the Thrift Shop's earnings yet to be added to this, the \$25,000 goal looks well within reach. At any rate, the Associated Auxiliaries certainly will not fall far short. And if they miss by a few dollars, that can be made up next year.

Opening Date Is Just About Set; Gift Shop Area Will Be Enlarged

Riddle Memorial Hospital will officially open its doors for business—the vital business of healing—on or about Feb. 18, 1963.

Riddle Hospital's Trhift shop started its first full season on Sept. 4 (last year it was opened in December) and by Oct. 17 it had a healthy gross of \$6180.04, including \$480 in memberships.

Chairman Ruth Graham has a new co-chairman, Middletown's Mrs. Charles (Saize) Macauley, who replaces the original co-chairman, Springhaven's Lillian Hinson. Mrs. Hinson recently resigned.

Mrs. Graham told the Riddlegram she wanted her appreciation of Mrs. Hinson's work on the record. "I don't think we could have gotten the Thrift Shop off the ground without Lillian's work.," she said. "She must receive a great deal of credit for whatever success it has had and for getting it started on a good foundation.

IT'S BY-LAW REVISION TIME

At its October meeting, the Women's Board presented to the representatives of each auxiliary copies of two revised sets of by-laws, one governing the operations of the Board, the other governing the operations of the individual auxiliaries.

The representatives were asked to have their auxiliaries study and vote on each set "as soon as possible." No deadline was set, but By-Laws Committee Chairman Mary Mallon urged that votes be taken at the earliest possible meeting, so that the new rules can go into effect.

The total vote of all members voting will determine the fate of the new regulations. That is, all the favorable votes by the members of each auxiliary will be added up, and all the unfavorable votes of all auxiliaries be added up, and the total vote for or against will decide whether the by-laws are adopted or not.

Guided tours to acquaint the public with its new hospital will begin about two weeks before that date. (Have you volunteered as a guide yet?)

A quiet cornerstone-laying ceremony will take place around the end of November, complete with a copper box of "historic" documents (including the Riddlegram)deposited in it. (Imagine scholars two or three centuries from now trying to reconstruct contemporary civilization on the basis of the accounts in the Riddlegram!)

The Hospital's gift shop area, which will be

operated by the Associated Auxiliaries, will be larger than originally planned, General Manager Ed James told the October Women's Board Meeting.

This will be possible because the data processing equipment that will be used to help with the nurses' paper work will reduce the amount of floor space needed for record-keeping facilities.

Mr. James issued an indirect challenge to the Associated Auxiliaries—and to newly-appointed Gift Shop chairman Dottie Fey—by explaining that the enlargement will cost about \$12,000, but that he expects this to be recovered in a year through aift shop earnings.

The revolutionary data-processing equipment will allow 12 1/2 to 20% more time for Riddle nurses to devote to patient care.
