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Nominations To Be Made May 13 At Open Meeting At Drexelbrook; Luncheon, Skit Will Feature Event

In addition to the nominations, the Women's Board will conduct the regular business of the meeting. The purpose of the open meeting is to acquaint members of the auxiliaries with the personnel and operations of the Women's Board.

Actually, all Women's Board meetings are open, in the sense that all members of all auxiliaries are always welcome to attend them. The May 13 meeting is special only because a special invitation has been issued, lunch is being served and a special program arranged in addition to the regular meeting.

Crossing Over Into Jordans? It's As Easy As Mulberry Pie

At any rate, it's as easy as Mulberry Lane.

We refer, of course, to Bowling Green's tour of the fabulous gardens of Riddle Board Member and Mrs. Clarence L. Jordan Saturday, May 11.

If you have any doubts about how to get there, all you have to do is find Mulberry Lane. And that's as easy as pie.

You enter it from Providence Road (Route 252) just north of Providence Road's intersection with Baltimore Pike.

If you are going north, you cross the Red Arrow tracks and, spang, there it is, immediately to your right just beyond the tracks, identifiable by the twin stone pillars on each side of the entrance to the road.

If you are coming down Providence (252) Road from the north, Mulberry Lane, is of course, on your left just before you get to the Red Arrow tracks.

Once you turn into the lane, posted arrows will point the way to the Jordans, and you've got it made.

And well you should. The Jordan garden is a horticultural miracle, its 31 acres replendant with ancient trees, flowering fruits, blazing shrubs, boxwood and emerald lawns.

Tickets (at \$1 each) can be purchased from your own auxiliary, from Bowling Green's Mrs. W. Rollin Keen (LO 6-2039) or at the door on the day of the tour.

The hours are from noon to 6 p.m. Plants will be on sale, summer items will be available and cocktails will be served (bring your own money) between 4 and 6.

Women's Board OKs Arrangement To Put Auxiliary Money To Work

Under a plan unanimously approved by the representatives to the Women's Board at the April meeting, current earnings of the Associated Auxiliaries and the individual auxiliaries are going to earn 4% interest for approximately six months.

Instead of keeping their earnings through May 1 in local bank accounts (or under mattresses), the A.A. and the individual auxiliaries are going to turn the money over to the Hospital as of that date.

The Hospital will then pay the Associated Auxiliaries 4% interest on this money until the Associated Auxiliaries make their annual payment on their pledge after the end of the fiscal year.

This procedure, it was pointed out, has the dual advantage of adding to the Associated Auxiliaries' annual income and providing capital for the Hospital at a lower interest rate than it would have to pay elsewhere.
